ALASKA STATE FAIR

This annual summertime fair in the Mat-Su Valley of Alaska entertains 300,000 visitors with Alaska Native cultural art and performances, 4H livestock auctions to raise money for youth scholarships and educational programs for grade school children. While not a glamorous grant, a new ADA-compliant restroom facility is a necessary, and appreciated, improvement for those attending the fair.





INIAN ISLANDS INSTITUTE

Alaska's Inian Islands feature a unique geography, environment and ecology, which the Institute uses to educate and inspire rising environmental leaders to create positive change. A Trust grant helped purchase the Hobbit Hole, a fiveacre property where Institute educates and trains future science and environmental leaders.



DENALI FAMILY SERVICES

Denali supports children who have severe mental health diagnoses by providing community-based services, including a special focus on therapeutic foster homes. Aging IT hardware received a much-needed upgrade through a Trust grant, which allows Denali to keep its important services running without interruption.

BREAST CANCER DETECTION CENTER

BCDC provides state-of-the-art technology to Alaska women to screen for breast cancer. It reaches women in the most rural parts of the state with its mobile screening vehicles, as well as at its main center in Fairbanks. Trust funds allowed BCDC to remodel its aging facility, resulting in upgraded patient amenities, ADA compliance and energy efficiencies.





FORAKER GROUP

Founded in 2001 to serve Alaska's nonprofit organizations, Foraker provides organizational development and education to nonprofit staff and leaders and serves as the voice of the Alaska nonprofit sector. With the help of a Trust grant, Foraker expanded its executive leadership initiative to provide specialized training to emerging and existing executive leaders.

GRITMAN MEDICAL CENTER

Gritman has served rural northwest Idaho's medical needs for more than a century, and it has done so with excellence, receiving national recognition for the care it provides. New mammography equipment allows Gritman to continue providing the critical care its patients need in a remote area of the state that has few options for health care.





MUSEUM OF IDAHO

Dedicated to sharing the cultural history of the intermountain west, Museum of Idaho's educational programs attract children and adults alike to its beautiful brick building. The museum has grown over the last 30 years, and the addition of an exhibition hall greatly enhances visitor experience and the museum's exhibit storage.



IDAHO BOTANICAL GARDEN

For more than 30 years, Idaho Botanical Gardens has enriched its visitors with the beauty of nature, while educating and entertaining with cultural and community events. Kids get in on the fun with an adventure garden just for them, as well as summer camps and classes. New restrooms that replace portable stalls have dramatically improved the experience for visitors of all ages.

BECAUSE INTERNATIONAL

A shoe that grows as a child grows is the invaluable product that Because provides to children in impoverished countries around the world who don't have shoes. A Trust grant helped increase Because's staff capacity to improve its ability to meet the needs of these children, moving them closer to their goal of reaching all 300 million.





UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

University of Idaho holds a strong focus on research, and a new project brings together the departments of computer engineering, computer science and secure systems. Its scientists are building a testbed that will enable research on smart grid and industrial control system cybersecurity, making it the first academic institution to have this capability.

CAMP MAK-A-DREAM

Children with cancer from all around the United States come to this beautiful converted ranch in Gold Creek to experience cost-free, medically supervised camping. A grant helped upgrade the HVAC system for improved energy efficiency and a better experience for campers.





JACK CREEK PRESERVE FOUNDATION

The Preserve is a 4,500-acre vital wildlife migratory corridor in Ennis, and the Foundation offers educational experiences around the values of wildlife management, land stewardship and hunter conservationists for schools and other groups. Affordable and reliable energy were recently put in place to accommodate its year-round visitors for day events, youth camps and research opportunities.



CHILD BRIDGE

Founded in 2010, Child Bridge recruits, trains and supports foster care families to reduce the number of children waiting in group homes, much of which is done through partnership with local Montana churches. Child Bridge is expanding its operations to Great Falls, with the help of a Trust grant, to provide more safe and supportive homes to foster children.

STEVENSVILLE PLAYHOUSE

The first community theater in Stevensville, the Playhouse produces original and classical theatrical productions, musical performances and community presentations, using 100 local actors of all ages. The construction of a three-story addition on the back of the Art Deco building will provide space for set storage, a green room and dressing rooms.






UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA

Montana Public Radio, broadcasting out the University of Montana, reaches 70,000 weekly listeners across western and north-central Montana with its 24/7 programming. The replacement of five aging transmitters ensures that its important programming will continue uninterrupted.

FANCONI ANEMIA RESEARCH FUND

Fanconi Anemia is a rare genetic disorder that leads to bone marrow failure and cancer, and the research fund is dedicated to finding effective treatments and a cure while increasing awareness of the disease. A grant to help expand its development program will help the research fund continue its life-saving work.





BEND SCIENCE STATION

Bend Science Station offers innovative science education to K-12 students in Central Oregon and training to teachers. The construction of a new science education facility will add two laboratory classrooms, a research lab and a teacher training lab, as well as office and storage space and an outdoor amphitheater.



DOGS FOR THE DEAF

Every year Dogs for the Deaf rescues dogs about 100 dogs from Washington, Oregon and California and trains them to serve people who are deaf or hard of hearing, autistic children, and for specialized service in doctors' offices and courts. The addition of a new training facility will allow Dogs for the Deaf to train more dogs to meet the needs of those on its long wait list.

BRITT MUSIC & ARTS FESTIVAL

Britt is an outdoor summer music festival in Medford that features classical, jazz, blues, folk, bluegrass, pop and country music, and throughout the year it offers musician residencies to bring regional musicians into local schools. A Trust grant provided new seating for the venue, along with new lighting, stairs, pathways and landscaping for an improved audience experience.





VIRGINIA GARCIA MEMORIAL HEALTH CENTER

Virginia Garcia provides primary, dental, vision, wellness, pharmacy and mental health care to migrant and seasonal farm worker families in Washington and Yamhill Counties. The acquisition and renovation of a new space for its Beaverton Clinic allows it to better serve the more than 11,000 patients who use its vital services.

CENTRUM FOUNDATION

Offering artistic workshops, festivals, performances and artist residencies yearround, Centrum's creative experiences attract 12,000 people of all ages from around the world every year. The lighting equipment in Centrum's two main performance venues was aging and in dire need of replacement, and a Trust grant upgraded them to simpler and more energy-efficient systems.





QUILCENE HISTORICAL MUSEUM

Located in Washington's Olympic Peninsula, Quilcene preserves the history of the region's native peoples, settlers and cultural and economic development. The museum acquired the historic Hamilton-Worthington mansion in 2013, with the vision to rehabilitate it and use it as a regional event center. Trust funds helped remove lead paint, add an ADA restroom and complete interior and exterior construction on the mansion.



WASHINGTON STEM

Interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics begins at a young age, and Washington STEM brings education in these fields to underserved communities of Washington, with a specific focus on minority students, girls and students from poverty-impacted areas. A Trust grant will help connect math resources to teachers and parents and expand programs to students from lowincome and diverse communities.

L'ARCHE TAHOMA HOPE COMMUNITY

L'Arche serves persons with intellectual disabilities by providing them with small and focused group homes, employment opportunities and meaningful community life with people from diverse cultural and faith backgrounds. The construction of a new welcome center expands L'Arche's programming for both its community residents and its non-resident members.





UNION GOSPEL MISSION OF SPOKANE

For more than 65 years, the Mission has served men, women and children to break the cycle of homelessness by meeting their physical and spiritual needs. A Trust grant helped renovate a facility into a crisis shelter for women and children experiencing homelessness in order to provide immediate safety and shelter.

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ATOMIC HERITAGE FOUNDATION

The Atomic Heritage Foundation is dedicated to preserving and interpreting the Manhattan Project National Historical Park and capturing the memories of the people who harnessed the energy of the atom. This grant is devoted to preserving stories of Manhattan Project participants, including African Americans, Hispanics, women and others who are under-represented in official accounts.





ARROW LEADERSHIP

Arrow develops both emerging and executive leaders in a faith-based, longterm mentorship program in British Columbia. The hiring of a new director of programs helped Arrow increase its capacity and expand its mentorship programs and services.



INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE MISSIOI

IJM works in developing nations to rescue victims, bring criminals to justice, restore survivors to safety and build infrastructure with local law enforcement. Over the last 20 years, it has rescued 34,000 victims from violence and secured convictions against 1,100 criminals in international courts. A Trust grant upgraded its data management system so IJM's staff can work more efficiently and focus on its work of bringing justice to the oppressed.

PACIFIC FOREST TRUST

PFT has helped conserve 250,000 forest acres in the Pacific Northwest, holds easements covering 98,000 acres in California and Oregon and manages four working forests, all while developing innovative forest and climate policies. PFT expanded its easements to include the Mountcrest Forest in Oregon, with the goal of carefully managing selective timber harvests in one portion and disallowing forest management activities on the remaining acreage.





YOUNG LIFE OF CANADA

Young Life's Malibu Club is nestled in the mountains and winding fjords of British Columbia and provides faith-based camps to youth and retreat facilities to schools, churches and other groups. A Trust grant helped renovate the Big Squawka club room, more than doubling its capacity and options for activities.

Enrichment

Education and the pursuit of knowledge were core elements of Jack Murdock's life. From a very young age until his untimely passing, Jack never stopped learning. He ingrained into his life, work and professional ventures the philosophy that only by learning can we improve and do better. This is reflected in the unique culture fostered by Jack and his business partner, Howard Vollum, at Tektronix, and it remains a key pillar at the core of the work we do every day at the Trust.

In addition to the inspiring work we've observed by all of our grantees, 2017 marked a year when we had the opportunity to work with hundreds of nonprofit professionals—from women in leadership to high school educators to nonprofit board leaders—as they invested considerable time to learn and grow in order to better serve their stakeholders.

Trust-sponsored enrichment programs are one of the ways we help ensure our grantees are set up for long-term success. But they are also our opportunity to better understand the unique challenges facing the nonprofits we serve and build relationships that can help guide our efforts in the future.

We are grateful to all of those who participated in our enrichment programs in 2017, allowing us to learn and grow alongside you. We look forward to continuing this work and helping bring positive change to organizations across the Pacific Northwest in 2018.






Total Assets, Grants Approved, & Grants Paid



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

Meet Jack Murdock

Our benefactor, Melvin J. "Jack" Murdock, was an avid learner, innovator and entrepreneur with business interests throughout the Pacific Northwest. At a young age, he established his own business selling and servicing radios and electrical appliances, and there he began working with Howard Vollum, with whom he developed the oscilloscope and co-founded Tektronix. Jack had a number of interests beyond Tektronix, including operating a Piper Aircraft distributorship for the Pacific Northwest, based in Vancouver, Washington.

He also established his own foundation, the Millicent Foundation (named for his mother), which was his personal vehicle of giving in the region. His practice of philanthropy lives on today in the form of the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust, established from his estate in 1975, and we're proud to carry on the spirit of Jack's life well-lived through the work of the Trust that bears his name.
